Welcome to Gunnison High School's VISUAL ARTS department. The Visual Arts teach students to see, search for solutions, and to express feelings and ideas artistically through numerous media. Visual arts classes are structured for a community of participants engaging in studying the phenomena of the creative process. This course is for anyone wanting to explore the relationship between art / life / self / other and community. Simply put, art education is for active experiential learning in a meaningful context that can be applied to any aspect of school and life.

ART 1: FOUNDATIONS

This course serves as an introduction to the basic materials, terms and techniques used in the visual arts. Art 1: Foundations is designed for students to develop an understanding and appreciation of artistic judgment and skill while exploring the stages of the creative process. Students will explore fundamental drawing, color theory, painting, printmaking and sculpture.

ART 2

Students build on their technical skills and knowledge base from ART 1 as they further develop and refine their own perceptions and practice. ART 2 students continue to develop their media mastery with drawing, printmaking, painting and sculpting skills. Art 2 encourages increased collaboration, focus, and experimentation of work created.

ART: ADVANCED

This course challenges students in the 3rd year of study who are potentially considering a career in the Visual Arts and or those simply genuinely interested in further exploration of their creative self. Students will continue to further develop abilities in common media as well as explore new ones. We will visit local galleries including WSCU, explore career opportunities, and learn about gallery management and hanging practices. Juniors in this level will exhibit two pieces in our annual show. Seniors will finish the year essentially have a miniature "solo" show in a group exhibition.

ART: CAPSTONE

This course challenges students in the 4th year of study who are potentially considering a career in the Visual Arts and or those simply genuinely interested in further exploration of their creative self. This course will focus on exploration of students' greatest areas of strength and interest with a constant emphasis on portfolio development. The concept for this course is to allow students who have a deep interest in Art to be able to continue their exploration in the studio arts as a whole. This class is also designed for certain student artists to develop a body of work that begins to show mastery in this area(s) of interest. This course is designed for students who would embrace the idea of an intensely focused freedom. This is for students who have or are developing a mature attitude towards the complex process and great responsibility of serious studio work. We will visit local galleries including WSCU, explore career opportunities, and learn about gallery management and hanging practices. Seniors will finish the year essentially have a miniature "solo" show in a group exhibition.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

Standards are the topical organization of an academic content area. The four Colorado High School Visual Arts Standards are:

1. Observe and Learn to Comprehend

Use the visual arts to express, communicate, and make meaning. To perceive art involves studying art; scrutinizing and examining art; recognizing, noticing, and seeing art; distinguishing art forms and subtleties; identifying and detecting art; becoming skilled in and gaining knowledge of art; grasping and realizing art; figuring out art; and sensing and feeling art.

2. Envision and Critique to Reflect

Articulate and implement critical thinking in the visual arts by synthesizing, evaluating, and analyzing visual information. To value art involves visualizing, articulating, and conveying art; thinking about, pondering, and contemplating art; wondering about, assessing, and questioning art concepts and contexts; expressing art; defining the relevance, significance of, and importance of art; and experiencing, interpreting, and justifying the aesthetics of art.

3. Invent and Discover to Create

Generate works of arts that employ unique ideas, feelings, and values using different media, technologies, styles, and forms of expression. To make art involves creating, inventing, conceiving, formulating, and imagining art; communicating, ascertaining, and learning about art; building, crafting, and generating art; assembling and manufacturing art; discovering, fashioning, and producing art; and causing art to exist.

4. Relate and Connect to Transfer

Recognize, articulate, and validate the value of the visual arts to lifelong learning and the human experience. To respond to art involves relating to art; connecting to art; personally linking to art; associating with art; bonding to art; moving toward art sensibilities; shifting to art orientations; thinking about art; attaching meaning to art; replying to art; reacting to art; internalizing art; personalizing art; and relating art to diverse cultures.
